

Pupil Premium

January 2017

Since the new regulations, beginning in September 2012, all schools have to state information about pupil premium and how it is used. Pupil premium is additional funding given to schools for 'disadvantaged' children. In our case the money given to us relates to those children on free school meals. For reasons of confidentiality we are not required to publish the amount of pupil premium we receive as the number of children on free school meals is very small.

Barriers to learning.

Speech and language on entry

Emotional and mental well being

Help with homework/home learning projects

Unsure of teaching methods used currently

We use the Pupil Premium Grant to contribute towards a wide range of interventions and support strategies. All of the strategies that we use are proven and well established. Mrs Lupton generally delivers these catch up programmes either on an individual or small group basis. Some interventions are however, led by the class teacher or other support staff. We also where applicable use some of this funding to reduce the cost of trips and visits (£100 reduction for Pupil Premium pupils for the annual residential). Termly Class newsletters keep parents informed of current learning opportunities, ways to help their child and expectations of homework and reading.

Parents' Information sessions help parents to understand the curriculum content and methods of strategies and learning styles.
